



Examples of Marks for Identification of Ownership









Suggested Position of Marks for Different Gear Types














The FAO Global ALDFG Survey – about the marking







A survey conducted with 15 countries, and several are in the pipeline 40 surveys are done with 3885 fishers who have answered

Translated as needed Standard questions across 9 identical questionnaires Differing only by fishing gear type **Enables comparison of results between regions**

The Circular Economy of Fishing Gear in Nordic Fisheries

We did collect information from stakeholders

Material can be tracked through the circular economy at most stages.

However!:

An unknown amount of material is entering the circular economy and leaking out as unreported ALDFG and disposal.

Unreported ALDFG
From the fishery

Manufacturing Direct import by user / fishing gear makers Reuse Fishing (users) Repurpose Unreported Disposal Recycling The Circular Economy of Fishing gear Collecting old Sorting and transporting fishing gear

The first recommendation from this work is

Improve gear traceability

- Implement Marking System
- Mandatory Registration System



Levels of fishing gear marking

First level: Passive regulations

Require traceable marking but do not specify how or what must be written on tags. Still no knowledge about the magnitude of fishing gear in use.

Second level: Guiding regulations

 Establish standards for tag design and label text, along with registering fishing gear in use.

Third level: Comprehensive registration system

 Tracks all fishing gear in use at any time, including materials used for End-of-Life Fishing Gear (EOLFG) recycling.

Iceland's Regulatory Framework for Marking Fishing Gear



- **Before regulations, it was common practice to mark gillnets**
 - Styrofoam floats were stamped, and concrete sinkers bore gravel lettering
- It has been mandatory for decades to mark gillnet locations in the gadoid fishery
 - Only surface markings and anchors were required
 - It was mandatory to report lost gillnets to the Coastguard, reports
 with including all required information
 Very few to cades
 very few to
- A new regulation mandating the marking of all fishing gear in use was launched in 2020
 - The vessel's registration number or IMO must be used
 - Not all types of fishing gear are mentioned in the text which may suggest that some are excluded
 - It is now mandatory to report all lost fishing gear to the Coastguard and Directorate of Fisheries --- and into the logbook

This remains a passive regulation for marking fishing gear, with weak incentives to report lost gear

No regular surveys for cleaning up lost fishing gear at fishing grounds are conducted in Iceland



Marking fishing gear is a cheap and easy method to fight against ALDFG
